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April 6th Afternoon Update - Yavapai County Community Health Services **Yavapai County has 57 Cases, First Death**

To date, **32,534** Arizonans have been tested for COVID-19. **1,108** residents have been tested in Yavapai County, with **1,054** tests being negative (95%). There are now **57** cases in Yavapai County; **10** in Prescott, **10** in Prescott Valley, **10** in Sedona, **13** Other-Quad-Cities, **6** Other- Verde; **1** unknown; 18 seniors 65+, 33 adults 18-64; 6 minors (0-17); 25 males, 32 females. VVMC is reporting no hospitalizations, with 8 persons under investigation. YRMC reported 3 hospitalizations, with 11 persons under investigation on West Campus, 3 on the East Campus.

What can I do if I am or may be ill with COVID-19?

If you develop symptoms and you've been exposed to the virus COVID-19, contact your doctor for medical advice. If you need to go to the doctor or hospital, call ahead so health care providers can take steps to ensure that others aren't exposed.

Take the following precautions to avoid spreading the illness:

- Stay home from work, school and public areas, except to get medical care.
- Avoid taking public transportation if possible.
- Wear a mask around other people.
- Isolate yourself as much as possible from others in your home.
- Use a separate bedroom and bathroom if possible.
- Avoid sharing dishes, glasses, bedding and other household items.

Should I wear a mask?

The CDC recommends wearing cloth face coverings in public places, such as the grocery store, where it's difficult to avoid close contact with others. This updated advice is based on data showing that people with COVID-19 can transmit the virus before they realize they have it. Using masks in public may help reduce the spread from people who don't have symptoms. Non-medical cloth masks are recommended for the public.
