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December 23rd Update - Yavapai County reports 216 COVID-19 Cases and 7 Deaths

ADHS reports 17,714 COVID-19 tests statewide since yesterday with 6,058 positive results and 54 deaths. Since the beginning of the pandemic, Yavapai County has tested 78,000 residents with 10,129 positive cases, 3,699 recovered, and 186 deaths. YRMC West has 75 COVID-19 patients, YRMC East is caring for 33 patients. VVMC reports 23 COVID-19 hospitalizations. The VA reports 7 COVID-19 patients.
