Make COVID-19 Safety Part of Your Holiday Planning: ADHS

Continued COVID-19 spread, influenza season, and the coming holidays make it more important than ever to plan ahead for safe gatherings with family and friends. "There are ways to enjoy holiday traditions and connect with your loved ones while protecting yourself, your family, and your community," said Dr. Richard Carmona, 17th U.S. Surgeon General and special adviser to Governor Doug Ducey and ADHS." "Making decisions that minimize transmission of COVID-19 and seasonal flu will help maintain hospital capacity for Arizonans who most need it." "The keys to putting COVID-19 in its place, even with the highly infectious Delta variant at work, are in our hands with the availability of safe, free, highly effective, and widely available COVID-19 vaccines and attention to the proven mitigation strategies," said Don Herrington, ADHS interim director.

It is important to not host or attend a holiday gathering if you are sick, have symptoms, or have recently been exposed to someone with COVID-19. Even if you are fully vaccinated against COVID-19, be sure to get your seasonal influenza vaccine as well. You can safely get vaccinated against influenza at the same time you receive a COVID-19 vaccine or booster dose. As long as COVID-19 transmission remains high or substantial, as is the case throughout Arizona, families should make safety part of your holiday planning by: 1) considering an outdoor gathering: 2) having participants, event those who are fully vaccinated, wear well-fitting masks over their nose and mouths in any indoor setting with those they don't live with: 3) maintaining at least 6 feet of physical distance from anyone you don't live with: 4) getting tested for COVID-19 if you have symptoms, have been in close contact with someone who is positive, or believe you have been exposed to COVID-19.

Yavapai County reports 746 COVID-19 Cases and 11 Deaths since Monday, November 15, 2021. The county has tested 99,505 residents for COVID-19 in the past 6 months, and there have been 31,207 positive cases and 759 deaths since the beginning of the pandemic. Yavapai Regional Medical Center reports 77 COVID-patients, VVMC reports 29 patients, and the VA has 6 COVID-19 patients. The County is still experiencing high transmission of COVID-19 with a 21.6% positivity rate and 407 cases per 100,000 residents for the week ending November 7, 2021.
